Florida State University's medical school has cashed in once again, thanks to the university's annual Dance Marathon.

The Dance Marathon and Children's Miracle Network at Shands Children's Hospital at the University of Florida on Tuesday presented a check for \$232,630 to FSU's College of Medicine.

Rick Bucciarelli, health affairs associate vice president for government relations at UF and FSU's Dance Marathon's leadership team, gave the check to Dr. John Fogarty, dean of the medical school.

"Since 2003, Dance Marathon has committed over \$1.4 million to Florida State's College of Medicine," Bucciarelli said.

Dance Marathon is one of the largest student-run philanthropy efforts at FSU and one of five founding Dance Marathons in the nation.

"We raised almost half a million dollars last year at Dance Marathon 2011," said M eagan Flint, director of FSU's Dance Marathon. "So far we've been on track with "It's been wonderful for us," Bucciarelli said. "Many of us on the committee in Gainesville h ave seen the fruits of (Dance Marathon's) labor."

Dance Marathon raises funds all year long, but its major event will be held the weekend of Feb. 17-19.

"Our students are making a firm commitment not only in their training, but also in their community outreach to make sure that we make a difference," said Wayne Munson, assistant dean for development for FSU's College of Medicine.
